One of the commanders of the parliamentary New Model Army which defeated the royalists in the English Civil War, Oliver Cromwell led the republican Commonwealth of England, taking the title of Lord Protector. He was elected one of the Top 10 Britons of all time in a BBC television poll.

Running non-stop between London and Glasgow, the **Coronation Scot** was an express train service introduced in 1937 to






C is for Cadbury. The company grew from one shop in Birmingham to become the world's largest confectionery manufacturer. Having opened their 'factory in a garden' in 1879, Richard and George Cadbury developed the area surrounding the works as housing for their staff. In 1900 the Bournville Village Trust was founded to administer and develop



Fleeing Milan for Rome following the wounding of a city official, Michelangelo Merisi (1571–1610), better known as **Caravaggio**, produced sublime art, his earlier scenes of everyday life such as **The Cardsharps** giving way to overwrought biblical compositions often featuring outlandish poses and grotesque decapitations rendered with **chiaroscuro** lighting effects. Outlawed following a killing, Caravaggio left Rome for Naples, where more violence led to his expulsion. Seriously disfigured in a brawl, after years of enforced wanderings and pursued by his enemies he died of fever while trying to return to Rome, where he hoped his art would earn him a pardon.



the village, which now houses 25,000 people in an environment true to George Cadbury's aim that 10% of the development should be parkland and open spaces.

With its elegant, understated styling and subtle paint scheme it is obvious why the 1959 **Cadillac Eldorado** was the favourite transport of Elvis Presley.





Located in Harlem at 142nd Street and Lennox Avenue, the **Cotton Club** was New York's most famous nightclub of the prohibition era. The leading black jazz performers played for the predominantly white clientele, with **Cab Calloway's** orchestra taking over from Duke Ellington's as the house band. The immensely popular Calloway played no instrument, could not read music, and his stentorian vocals were least disruptive in a string of best selling novelties, such as *Minnie the Moocher*, which obscured the musical quality of the orchestra and its soloists. A natural showman, he later triumphed on Broadway with his definitive interpretation of the role of Sportin' Life in Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess*.
